Towne Lake experienced an unusual late winter and spring. After several years of record droughts, we had a very wet spring including the “500-Year, 10+ Inch Rainfall” in May, which caused major damage to many areas of “Our Neighborhood.” As noted in other articles in this newsletter, your Board has been and is now addressing such issues as a damaged dam on the east end of the #15 lake, damaged shrubbery, missing rocks, and etc., at the bridge crossings on Towne Lake Drive and Green Chase Circle. We also experienced damage in one form or another to all four lake fountains, most of which have been repaired.

Correction of such damage takes time and money, and your Board in being good stewards of your Association dues has been and is diligently working to resolve all these issues as economically and quickly as reasonably possible.

I personally, along with your Board, express sincere appreciation to the 99.9% of our wonderful neighbors who continue to send your semi-annual Association dues on a timely basis, as these funds are essential for us to keep “Our Neighborhood” beautiful, clean, and attractive, thereby enhancing and protecting property values. Thank you all for your support!

Other recent questions raised by some neighbors are concerns about the “gator grass” around many of the lakes. Our grounds maintenance crews spray this grass each year, but, because of the extremely wet ground surrounding many of the lakes, they could not get equipment in to spray without damaging the grounds.

We hope this matter will have been resolved by the time this newsletter is published as we now have the dry weather needed to spray.

While we are on the subject of “Gators,” Board member Bob Frye fortunately knew a “Real Alligator Catcher” from Elmore County, who caught and re-located one of our alligators, and is on standby to try to catch any other alligators spotted if neighbors will notify the Board of “gator sightings.”

Finally, we hope those neighbors who attended the “Neighborhood Ice Cream Social” at Arrowhead Country Club May 31st enjoyed getting to meet and socialize with friends and neighbors from our community.

Enjoy Our Flowers

Our Towne Lake flower beds are again improving our quality of life and the value of our homes. They have come to life with a fresh spring planting. This spring's abundant rains have made our plants green and beautiful. The beds are full of color and get periodic weeding from our contractor—the same company that plants and maintains the beds at East Chase and several other major stop-offs in town.

Dam and Fountains in Distress

One of the dams that creates our lakes is in trouble. Laurens Pierce, Towne Lake Homeowners Association Board President, met May 19 with Cabot Stough, Board member who oversees our neighborhood grounds and irrigation systems, to evaluate the dam that is near the 15th green of the Arrowhead Country Club golf course. The back of the dam has had the rocks that were against the dam wall washed away, there is a small crack in the concrete dam wall leaking small amounts of water, and both sides of the "wing walls" extending off each end of the dam have a huge washed-away area by the east side of them.

The well-being of the dam is critical to us as a neighborhood. If the dam were to give way, we would lose the Green Chase lake from the tennis courts at Arrowhead all the way to the dam which would make a mud hole out of the beautiful #15 lake, as well as the Green Chase lakes. It most probably would flood many homes on the lower end of Wiltshire. Your board is working to resolve the situation so that our property will retain its beauty, value, and safety.

The storm also affected every Towne Lake fountain. Your Board is working to get everything back to normal as soon as possible.

Some non-Towne Lake residents have been walking through some of the private residents' yards to access the lake behind (East side) Towne Lake Dr. and (North side) of Bristol Way to fish. Residents have called the Montgomery Police Department (MPD) non-emergency number, and the MPD has found several people in our neighbors' yards. Your Board has approved new "No Trespassing" signs for the lake area, but there's little else we can do. If you see non-neighborhood people fishing or swimming in the neighborhood lakes, call the non-emergency MPD phone number: 241-2651.

Help Keep Our Neighborhood Clean

When people take walks in Towne Lake, many pick up paper, bottles, and cans that others have carelessly thrown from their cars. Thank you! An issue that keeps coming up among Towne Lake walkers is the presence of dog droppings on walking routes. *Most* people pick up after their pets, *but* others leave their dog's poop out for others to see and smell. If you are one of the few who do not pick up after your pet, please start doing so. Our neighborhood will continue to be a "show stopper" if each of us considers our neighbors and helps to control litter of all kinds.

Streets and Sidewalks

Towne Lake has needed very few repairs to our streets and sidewalks this year and we hope that will continue. We did have some damage from the storm a few months ago and the City of Montgomery has done a good job of repairing much of this damage. At this time the City of Montgomery is making high priority repairs to areas of the city that suffered more storm damage than Towne Lake and this might delay any repairs needed in Towne Lake. Gators

Your Board has asked for help from the authorities several times, but we cannot do anything *directly* to remove alligators from our lakes. At least one alligator was captured and relocated by Byron Smith, Elmore County's alligator control officer. He coordinated his efforts with Montgomery County officials.
